The Values of Craft

Dear Participants,

Welcome to Leiden! We are excited you have decided to participate in the *Values of Craft* expert meeting. Craft has seen a surge of interest over the last decade, as a topic of scientific interest, daily practice, or act of socio-political contestation. A variety of disciplines are currently involved in craft studies and each of them seems to distinguish different values of craft. Young people seem to value the vocational and meaningful character of craft. In line with this, craft is politically charged by valuing its principles of excellence and durability and claiming these as a pathway to the future. A new generation of craftspeople stresses ethical aspects of their work, emphasizing sustainability for instance. They value what they make, but clearly also how it is made. Anthropologists have recognized this as a difference between making and doing, each of which creates its own value. In academia, the field of heritage focusses on safeguarding knowledge of 'old' crafts, valuing tradition and authenticity. The 'material turn' in the humanities brought attention to craft, and in particular the role and value of materials. This also affects fields such as economics and architecture where we can observe a shift in the perception of materials, such as the proposal for the Universal Declaration of Material Rights. Moreover, there is increasing interest in exploring alternative economic systems, based for instance on the work of Thornstein Veblen and his 'Instinct of workmanship'. The goal of this seminar is to bring together these different perspectives to explore cross-disciplinary approaches to craft, how they are interrelated, and whether they converge in a shared set of research questions for the future.



Schedule

Our upcoming workshop is organised around group sessions to assure that there is plenty of time to interact and discuss. There will be only a few presentations, to get us fired up. The rest of the time, we will split into smaller groups and work on particular work packages. These work packages I have distilled from our academic work and the interests and questions that you have sent to me. There are four work packages (WP):

- 1) **Skill, cognition, and learning** (chair: Trevor Marchand)
- 2) Values, economics, and craft as heritage (chair: Arjo Klamer)
- 3) Politics, identities, and craft communities (chair: Catalin Popa)
- 4) Materials, design, and sustainability (chair: Udo Pesch)

There are three sessions of 30 minutes each, in which we split up in groups of 4/5 according to the WP of your interest. During these group sessions, we focus on: 1) *Questions and definitions*, 2) *Relevance*, 3) *Case studies*. Each WP has a chair who will ensure continuity and, at the end of day two, presents the findings of the group. After each group session there is a full hour in which we converge, summarise, and discuss the ideas of each individual group.
